How to sail in the presence of cetaceans

ROYAL DECREE 1727/2007, of December 21, 2007, which establishes measures for the protection of the cetacean

For whale watching activities, an administrative authorization issued by MITECO is required (article 3.4 Law 41/2010, of December 29 and article 61 Law 42/2007)

Bans

Without whale watching authorization:

Approaching less than 500 m (1.600 ft) from the cetaceans

With whale watching activity authorization:

Accessing or remaining into the Exclusion Zone except in case of emergency or urgent need.

Swimming or diving with cetaceans.

Making any kind of physical contact with cetaceans.

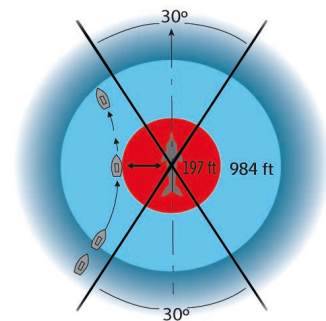
Feeding cetaceans, throwing litter into the sea, or any other type of dumping.

To disturb, impede free movement intercept its trajectory. To cross or disperse a group, and especially, to come between an adult and its calf.

To produce loud or shrill noises and sounds to attract or drive them away, including the emission of sounds underwater.

Reversing or circling.

Overflying with aircraft at an altitude of less than 500 m (1,000 feet).



- Exclusion Zone from 0 to 197 ft
- Restricted stay zone from 197 to 984 ft
- Approach zone from 984 to 1640 ft

Good practices

- Approach smoothly, converging with the animals swimming direction at an angle of approximately 30°, and no faster than 4 knots.
- If cetaceans approach within 60 meters (200 ft) of the boat, put it in neutral or disengage the engine. Stop the engine if necessary.
- In the case of dolphins and porpoises approaching, you are allowed to continue sailing, maintaining speed and course.
- Changes of speed or engine revolutions have to be progressive and slow.
- In case of finding an injured or dead animal, **call 112.**

Sanctions

Law 42/2007, of December 13, 2007, on Natural Heritage and Biodiversity.

- Fines from € 100 to € 2.000.000

* The most common groups of cetaceans along the Spanish coasts are: whales (fin whales), pilot whales, porpoises, dolphins, beaked whales, killer whales and sperm whales.
